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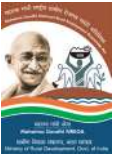

INTRODUCTION

Mahatma Gandhi NREGA, a central flagship programme which guarantees 100 days employment to rural households whose adult members agree to carry out unskilled manual work, was launched in the State in 2006. After more than a decade, the programme continues to benefit the rural households of Meghalaya in numerous ways. The assets created the additional income through wages and the livelihood assets created have boosted the income of the rural households. Durable assets created under the programme serves varied purposes and connected several service deliveries to these villages which were earlier not connected. Roads and footpaths provided connectivity to unconnected Villages, checkdams, irrigation canals, plantation etc., augments in Natural Resource Management, durable structures such as Anganwadi Centres which also acts as early child development centres and many others. This right based programme is still being rolled out in spirit and letter across the State through the Village Employment Councils at the grassroot level and the number of benefitting households have been increasing.

During the financial year 2020-21, the Labour Budget approved by the Ministry of Rural Development (MORD) is **393 lakh persondays** which is **12.29%** more than the previous year's approved budget (350 Persondays). The achievement stood at **383.70 lakh persondays** which touched **97.63%** of the projections, providing **71.53 % of average persondays per household**. The COVID-19 pandemic although it had an impact on the programme implementation during the year, yet it continued to be a lifeline for the rural households which is visible in the demands made by them during the period of lockdown. The persondays achieved stood as the highest when compared to previous financial year

The fund made available to the State during the FY 2020-21 was **₹ 166024.36 lakh**, of which the utilization stood at **₹ 161882.64 lakh**. Of this, the actual expenditure during the year was

₹ 97496.76 lakh on **Wages**, **₹ 3909.57 lakh** on **materials** and **₹ 3619.48 lakh** on **Administrative expenses**. The total expenditure also included the refund of the State Corpus Fund borrowed during FY 2018-19 of **₹ 3800 lakh** and the transfer of the accumulated interest under NeFMS. Wages component to the Consolidated Fund of India for an amount of **₹ 29.23 lakh**. The fund increased in the sanctioned from the previous financial year amount to **₹ 22924.46 lakh**.

Water Conservation Campaign (WCC) under Jal Shakti Abhiyan (JSA) 2.0 continued during the year and greater awareness was generated which percolated to the grassroot level. This is evident in the increasing number of works taken up towards water conservation, plantation, trenches and the likes.

Technology intervention such as the SECURE Software and GIS mapping helped in streamlining the process of preparation of plans and estimates and in improving the planning process particularly on NRM activities. While all Blocks and Districts adopted SECURE Software, GIS planning could be extended to **211 VECs** of the State during the year. The aim is to ensure coverage of 100% GIS planning in all VECs.

With the programme continuously being a backbone for Rural Development and for promoting livelihood interventions, there are no doubts challenges that still obstruct the smooth flow. Direct Benefit Transfer is the major setback in terms of bringing about transparency in disbursement of wages due to the absence or limited presence of banking infrastructure in the remote Blocks. Internet connectivity being the link for all online transactions also continue to be a challenge particularly in the remote Blocks of the State.

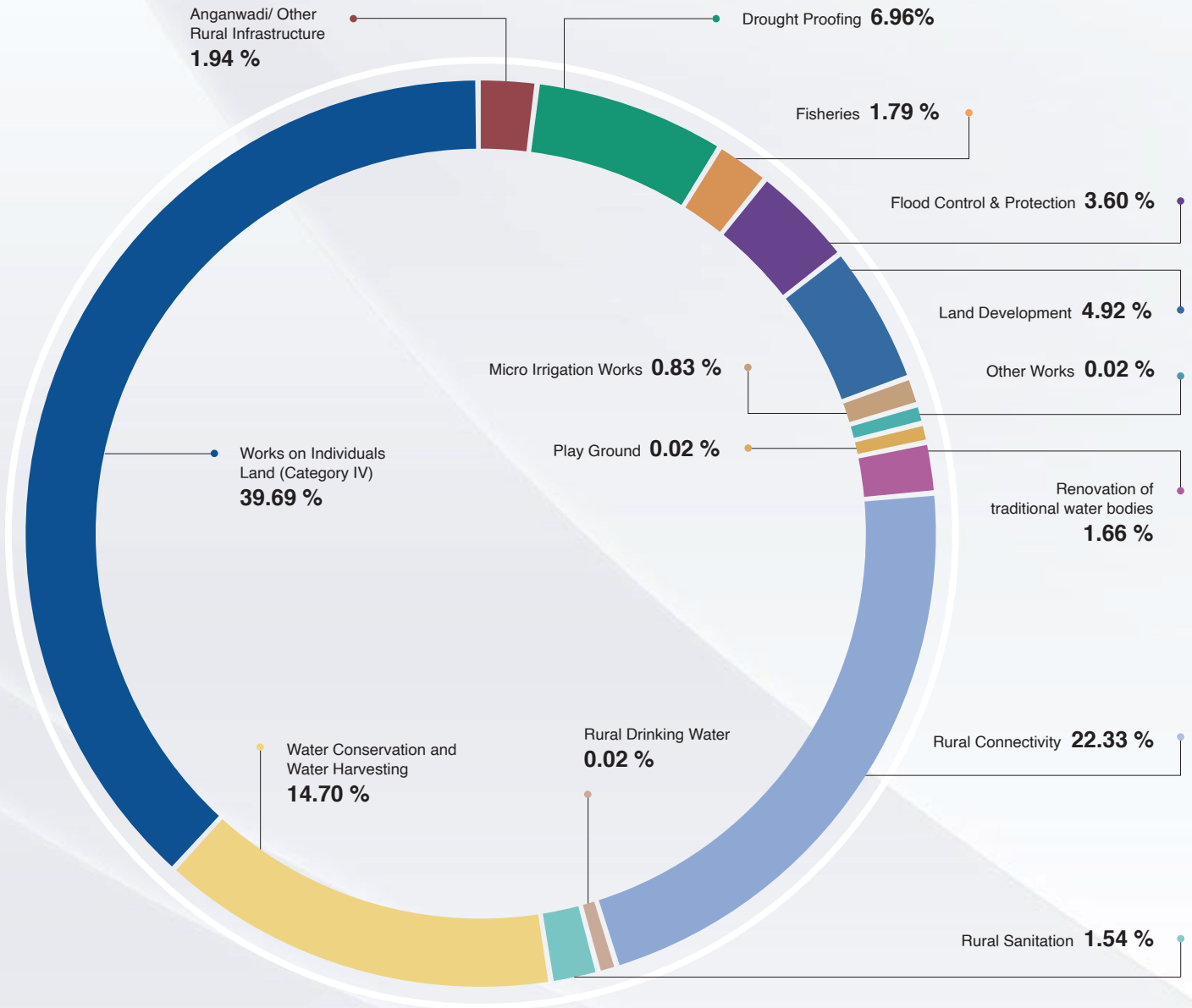


Chart 01: Percentage of works under different work categories during Financial Year 2020-21.

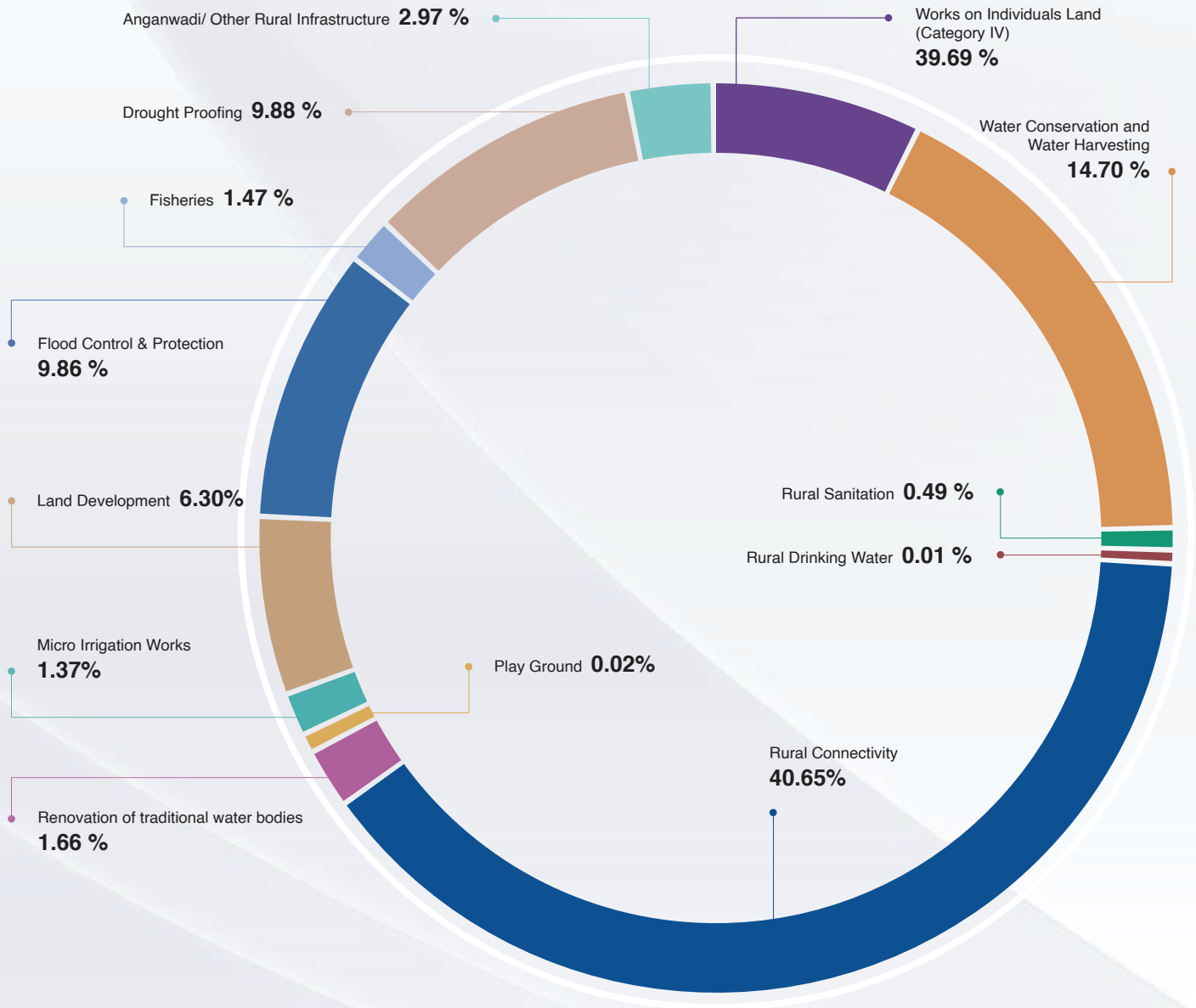


Chart 02: Percentage of works expenditure under different work categories during Financial Year 2020-21.

DEPARTMENT FIELD VISIT

On 26th January, 2021 an inspection was carried out by **Shri. Hamletson Dohling, MLA, Hon'ble Minister of Community and Rural Development, Government of Meghalaya** in Songsak and Dambo-Ronjeng C&RD Blocks, East Garo Hills. The Deputy Commissioner, the Project Director, Officers from State Rural Employment Society (SRES), District and Block officials were present during the inspection.

SONGSAK C&RD BLOCK

1. PMAY-G House: Inspection was carried out in Songsak Agitokgre VEC where a PMAY-G House was constructed which belongs to Smti. Samseni M. Sangma. The House was sanctioned during the FY 2016-17 at a total cost of ₹ 1,30,000 plus a crowd funding contribution by well-wishers of ₹ 67,000. A special initiative was made by the District using Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) funding under SELCO Foundation, Bengaluru which contributed materials for rain water harvesting and solar panels to this family. The area of the plinth is 40 sqm and it also has an attached toilet.



2. Embankment: Construction of earthen embankment and construction of retaining wall at Tasek Lake in Napak Apal VEC, under MGNREGA were inspected. The embankment was constructed during the FY 2019-20 with a total length of 167 metres. The construction of the embankment was the joint effort of Six (6) VECs namely Napak Apal, Rongre Bazar, Napak Bolchugre, Napak Taangkama, Napak Tasek and Napak Apal Adogittim wherein 260 Job Cards were involved. The main aim of the project was to increase the area under the Tasek Lake and to preserve the habitation of the soft-shelled turtle which was spotted in the area. Each VECs were divided into different categories of works. The overall cost of this project is



₹ 1,25,20,345 and a total of ₹ 600,000 was received from MLAMP as a Convergence fund.

Other activities such as earthen trenches and plantation were also taken up as part of the project. The total number of saplings planted was 10,000 out of which the survival rate was reported to be only 50%. The area of the lake is around 16,329 sqm.

OBSERVATION: The project on earthen embankment appears to be on a higher side in terms of the cost incurred. The culverts are constructed through a different Work code and not part of the whole project. One of the culverts is at a cost of ₹165,303.

Issues discussed/ expressed by the District and Block:

1. Funds are not received in time which has affected the completion rate of houses. Sometimes the materials procured are spoiled as they could not be utilised in time.
2. Masons who are skilled workers are not from the VEC and hence it delays the work when no Masons are available.
3. Training under RMT is still required to train more local Masons
4. The ₹ 10,000 hill subsidy is too low considering the terrain, the road connectivity and the price of materials. If the amount can be increased, it would be of help.
5. Songsak block does not have the Multi Facility Centre (MFC) which other blocks are being sanctioned.
6. The Block office does not have a proper boundary wall and the quarters also require repair works.



DAMBO-RONGJENG C&RD BLOCK

1. PMAY-G House: Another PMAY-G House that was inspected belongs to Mellorish Momin at Nengpatchi VEC, Dambo-Rongjeng C&RD Block. The House was sanctioned at a cost of ₹ 1,30,000 under PMAY-G and there was also a convergence with MGNREGA which generated 91 persondays during the FY 2017-18. IN addition to the amount sanctioned under PMAY-G, the beneficiary contributed a substantial amount through sale of various produce such as arecanut, cow, etc which resulted in the total cost being ₹ 4,50,000 towards the construction of the house. A special initiative was made by District using Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) funding under SELCO Foundation, Bengaluru which contributed materials for rain water harvesting to this family. The household is yet to construct the toilet facilities.



2. Pavement: The construction of Footpath with Pavers Block at Darugre Songma VEC constructed during the FY 2019-20 at a total cost of ₹ 9,41,900 were inspected. The pavement was constructed at a total length of 200 metres and 2 metres wide.



Issues discussed/ expressed by the District and Block:

1. The office building is in a bad shape and requires repair
2. Rongjeng Block also did not receive the Multi Facility Centre (MFC) and request for sanctioning of the same.
3. The AWCs which are constructed through prefabricated structures requires additional amount of about ₹ 63,000 for completion of installation i.e. towards transportation of structures, purchase of tools and hiring of skilled labour. Further, for new proposals, the cost sharing from Social Welfare Department has been reduced to only ₹ 1,00,000 which will likely affect the Centres with a reduction of ₹ 1,00,000 from the total cost of each unit.



During the interaction, the reservation policy of VEC functionaries was also discussed with the beneficiaries. They expressed willingness to implement the policy of reservation of women for the post of VEC Secretary.

COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP AND INSTITUTIONAL BUILDING PROGRAMME

The Community Leadership & Institutional Building Programme (CL&IBP) instituted at State Rural Employment society (SRES) during the FY 2017-18 was initiated with the aims to strengthening the village level institutions i.e., the VECs to enhance their leadership skills, promote active participation, mobilizing resources, guidance and any other activities relating to good governance & management. Under the programme officials have been placed at the State & Block levels.

Summary of findings under Community Leadership & Institutional Building Programme (CL&IBP)

1. The programme has proven to be an essential instrument in addressing the economic conditions and acts as safety net for the poor and vulnerable sections of society through wage employment and creation of sustainable assets which provides alternative livelihoods.
2. Although most of the Job Card Holders are having other sources of income such as through agricultural activities, labour work, etc they have however expressed that MGNREGA has made major contributions in creating employment opportunities. Apart from their daily activities, they have expressed that major development and transformation of the village are the impacts of the MGNREGA in the form of rural infrastructures, additional income through livestock sheds and environmental benefits aided through Natural Resource Management works.
3. It enhances the responsibility of the VECs in the process of holistic development of the village, promote equality to all groups of society, women empowerment and provide social protection for the most vulnerable people in the community by providing livelihood opportunity.
4. Implementation of MGNREGA helps promote social inclusion of the village whereby all stakeholders including women, young adults and other sections of the society play a pivotal role in decision making. It creates a sense of responsibility and bring a good relation and closeness within the village as they work together to address and solve common problems.
5. Beyond the economical and social aspects of development which the scheme addresses, environmental development is another important aspect which MGNREGA contributes to; by mandating 60 percent of its total expenditure towards Natural Resource management. It acts as a tool in educating the rural population on the needs and importance of water, land and soil conservation.

GRIEVANCE REDRESS

The State Rural Employment Society (SRES) received a total of 36 complaints. Out of these 2 are lodged at the CPGRAMS portal and the rest are received either through complainants in writing or through the helpline. The grievances are attended to by the State Team or forwarded to the District for speedy disposal. While all efforts were made to close all grievances, the number of cases disposed is 9.

With numerous cases received from Selsella and Demdema C&RD Blocks of West Garo Hills, the Grievance Monitoring Cell was also notified on **16th February, 2021**. To ensure timely disposal of complaints which are resolved are as below

TRAINING AND CAPACITY BUILDING

Training and capacity building plays a pivotal role in bringing awareness to the grassroot level functionaries. It not only empowers through knowledge training but also assist in the smooth implementation, record keeping, documentation, etc. New features that were introduced by the Central and State were also quickly disseminated through such platforms.

Trainings were provided on topics such as record maintenance, new procedure and process such as implementation of SECURE software, the targets under the Focus Area and Convergence [with PMAY(G), AWC, etc.], Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), Natural Resource Management, GIS based planning, Good Governance Initiative, Jal Shakti Abhiyan, Village Level Development Plan (VLDP), Mission Antyodaya survey etc. Training on specific focus such as Bottom-20 approach, composts, formation of States at VEC level, etc are also incorporated.

During FY 2020-21, due to the COVID-19 pandemic affecting the State and across the globe, there is fear and panic amongst the people especially in rural areas where there is a lack in communication through print & electronic media. Awareness programme is therefore necessary to educate the people on COVID-19 and how to prevent the spread of the disease.

CLUSTER FACILITATION PROGRAMME (CFP)

The Cluster Facilitation Project (CFP) was launched by the Hon'ble Union Minister Rural Development in December 2019. Under Cluster Facilitation Project, the focus is to provide rural livelihood under MGNREGA to aspirational and other backward regions of the country. The main objective of the CFP was to ensure effective implementation of MGNREGA particularly in the key areas of concerns. The programme was earlier initiated as Cluster Development Team Projects in 2013 for which Meghalaya was not actively involved as pilot Blocks.

With the reports of the study conducted in Jharkhand, there were several positive outcomes brought through the intervention which includes greater awareness, timely payment, improvement of availability of works, improvement of participation of SC/ST, women workers and better conduct of Rozgar Diwas. The attributes are important in the measurement of the healthy implementation of MGNREGA.

Meghalaya initiated the process during June 2020 and a proposal was made to the MoRD to implement the CFP in two Blocks of Ri Bhoi District viz., Jirang and Umling. Subsequently, a financial proposal amounting to ₹ 440.33 lakh was approved by the MoRD for three FYs which is 100% Centrally funded.



The programme was rolled out and recruitments were made to fill various posts of NRM, Agri-Allied and GIS experts at the State, District and Block level. Altogether, 23 staff were put in place by the end of the financial year. **These are as Table (12) below:**

GEOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION SYSTEM (GIS)

The GIS based Planning, initiated during financial year 2019-20 was introduced in only 2 VECs per Blocks.

The approach was initiated with the aims of providing guidance to the MGNREGA functionaries in preparing before NRM plan. It involve several processes such as extraction of various thematic maps of the area of the VEC, thereby ,enabling them to study the area and make better informed decision on the best works to be taken up. Also the drainage line and control line may also be generated to better understand the elevation and water runoff in and around the VEC, enabling them to propose the best place for various water harvesting structure like check dam, More over some if the thematic maps help them to understand the general ground water prospect for better placing of well to maximized ground water harvesting output.

During the year, the plan process was extending to two more VECs per Block and as State initiative; a target was made to cover all VECs. The achievement/ progress made during the year is as under.

SECURE (SOFTWARE FOR ESTIMATE CALCULATION USING RURAL RATES FOR EMPLOYMENT)

The Software for Estimate Calculation using Rural Rates for Employment (SECURE) Application, a software for online estimate preparation under Mahatma Gandhi NREGA was rolled out for implementation on pilot basis in the year 2018. On 5th October, 2020, the feature was rolled out live in all 11 Districts of the State. **The application accords Technical Sanction and Administrative Sanction sanctioning power to different level engineers as below**

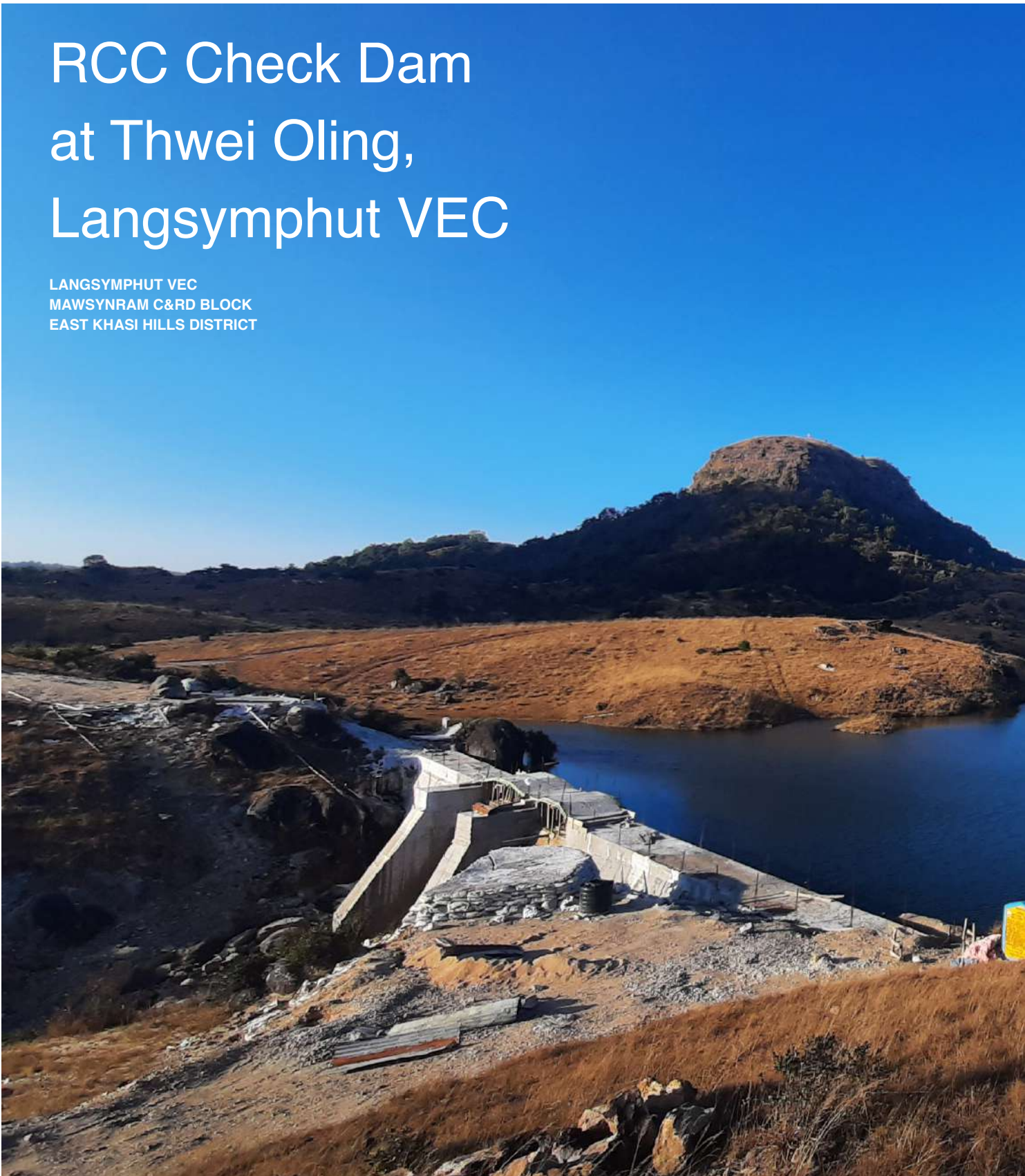

Langsymphut VEC is located 22 km away from Mawsynram C&RD Block of East Khasi Hills District and it is blessed with abundant rainfall. The area often been credited as being the wettest place on Earth and received an average of 11,872 mm in annual rainfall.

Despite receiving sufficient amount of rainfall all throughout the year, due to lack of proper water storage facilities, the runoff water flows down the stream and waterfall and the same was not able to utilize. Prior to the construction of the project, villagers are unable to store the rain water for future use, resulting in scarcity of water especially in the winter season.

With the collective efforts of the local people and the Block officials, the proper planning, estimate preparation and commitment, the project could be materialized at a reasonable amount. As a result, the water level in the site increased remarkably and has a capacity to store more than **4,00,000 cubic metre** (approx). This is the first mega check dam taken up under Mahatma Gandhi NREGA in the Block.

The project was completed at a total cost of ₹ 21,80,000/- out of which ₹ 9,01,580 was towards material component, ₹ 12,60,021 (MGNREGA) on wages and ₹ 18,399 which is Project Management Cost (PMC). Trenches and tree plantation was also taken up to prevent soil erosion and adding more life to the surrounding.

Moreover, the check dam is located on the foothill of the famous Lum Symper/Symper Peak, which implies that this place holds a huge potential for tourism in the years to come. The project not only ensures the availability of water for the community but it will in turn generate additional employment avenues for the local. The VEC anticipate in making the initiative a focal point for eco-tourism.



Multipurpose Mini Gravity Storage Dam at Mawtawar

Mawtawar is a village in Mawlai C&RD Block of East Khasi Hills District, which is located in the outskirts of the State capital city Shillong. The area receives plenty of rain during the monsoon but the rainwater flows down through perennial streams into the marshy community land and the same is not being utilized. Giving utmost priority to water harvesting, conservation and regulate water run-off from hills, the Area Employment Council (AEC) mooted the idea to conserve water at source on Wahkdait stream, and a multipurpose mini gravity storage dam was planned.

Prior to the implementation of this project, the residents of Mawtawar village had survived from the constant source of unconfined aquifer located in the Wahkdait which is about 1 km from the village. This source was the only potable water located within a comfortable distance for the residents. With time, the water table of this natural spring became low and the discharge was less. There is one underground water tank constructed by Public Health Engineering Department of about **250 cubic metre** which stored water flow of the spring and served as water supply for the whole village. However, the existing water storage cannot meet the demand of the increasing population of the village, more so because of the semi-urban condition of the location. Hence, storage weir is required to store the natural spring and the runoff during monsoon season in order to serve as supply during the dry season.

One of the recommendations based on the demand received from the community was creation of a Water Management asset and identified a suitable location for the construction of a multipurpose mini gravity storage dam. The project was implemented under Mahatma Gandhi NREGA. The plan and estimates was prepared in collaboration with a few State line departments viz. **Water Resources Department, Public Health Engineering Department and Soil and Water Conservation Department.**

Four Village Employment Councils (VECs) viz. Mawtawar Pdengshnong VEC, Lummawsing VEC, Riattamdong VEC and Laitlum VEC carried out the construction of the project. During the implementation stages the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown had slowed down the progress as procurement of materials and engaging of labour was a challenge. However, the VECs continued with the efforts and the project was finally completed physically during 2020-21.

All technical guidance required was provided by the State Line Departments, right from planning stage till physical completion of the project. The dam is comprised into 6 Blocks (A, B, C, D, E and F). The spillway is through Block B. The spillway is designed as Ski jump bucket structure to dissipate the velocity from **11.17 m/sec to 2.58 m/sec**. The storage capacity is about **3,925 cubic metre** or approximately **40,00,000 litres**.

The project envisaged to cater to the water supply needs of the village. There is no village inhabitation in the project submergence area. These durable assets potentially generated environmental benefits such as reduction of soil erosion, water and biodiversity conservation, enhancing food security and building resilience to current climate risks.

Balalgre VEC, a small hamlet which falls under Selsella C & RD Block, West Garo Hills District, has a small population which is mostly engaged in agricultural activities. Paddy is the staple crop and as it is dependent largely on sufficient water for a good yield, the multipurpose reservoir was constructed to augment the irrigation needs of the farmers.

The construction of the multipurpose reservoir was primarily put forward by the Job Card Holders of the particular V.E.C. The Technical Assistant of the concerned Block then visited the village to look into the feasibility of constructing the reservoir. Multiple perennial natural source of spring water were identified and the site was selected to construct the project. The project was implemented in Convergence Mode with Integrated Basin Development and Livelihood Programme (I.B.D.L.P.).

Prior to the construction of the reservoir, the spring water could not be utilised properly as the people used indigenous methods to collect the water from the source to their fields or homes. After the construction, the water is now used for multiple purposes. The people are able to channelize the water to their paddy fields and also use it to meet their domestic requirements.

The project was completed at a total cost of ₹ 16,80,240/- out of which ₹ 8,82,000 was towards material component, ₹ 6,58,240 on wages (MGNREGA) and ₹ 2,00,000 which is Convergence fund (I.B.D.L.P.).

Despite the Covid-19 pandemic, the VEC tried their best in contributing their hands to prevent the natural resource management by taking up conservation and water harvesting works. Lumputhoi VEC selected the construction of Check Dam and placed in the Shelves of Project of the VEC and implemented it in the FY 2020-21.

The construction of Check dam at Lumputhoi VEC was completed with the active participation of 116 job card holders and contributes 3,679 persondays. There was an outstanding contribution by the women Job Card Holders in which they contributed 90 % of their work. Both skilled and semi-skilled workers were involved in the construction of projects.

The villagers earlier had to walk a long distance to fetch clean drinking water and for washing purpose. However, with the construction of the Check Dam in the VEC, it has reduced the burden of the villagers. This project has eased the local people on their daily needs and for the farmers by channelling the water to their paddy.

The dam has been able to retain the water capacity of 900 cubic metre (900,000 liters) which earlier flows away. The dam serves as a multi-purposes project, apart from the domestic uses and irrigation; the dam provides an ample scope for rearing fish and also controls runoff water and prevent soil erosion.

Before the construction of the Check dam, nearly 38% of the water supply came from wells and tube wells. Hence, 75% of the villagers responded that there was a need of check dam in the village. After construction of the check dams the groundwater level has improved and has changed the cropping pattern in the area.

Khonglah VEC is located 20 Km away from Amlarem C&RD Block of West Jaintia Hills District. The vision and planning of the project took place in the Financial Year 2019-20. Villagers approach the block officials and shared their plans of constructing Water Conservation Dam. In the financial year 2020-2021, all the plans had been achieved through the implementation of the Mahatma Gandhi NREGA.

The villagers of Khonglah VEC are mostly engaged in agricultural activities. However, lack of proper water storage, made it difficult for them to plant their crops. But with the construction of this dam, the water from the Dam can be used to irrigate the fields, in case there is less monsoon rain. The Dam helped in recharging the ground water as slight improvement in the water levels. The dam can retain water into more than **1,00,000 litres** of storage capacity within the project area.

With the joint efforts, the VEC and the Block Development Officer & Programme Officer came up with a solution to construct a check dam in one of the nearby sources in the village. The project was completed at a total cost of ₹ 27,92,870 out of which ₹ 16,02,681 is on material component and ₹ 11,90,189 on wages generating 5,863 persondays.

The Dam helped in recharging the ground water as slight improvement in the water levels. According to the villagers, they felt that this is one of the best assets they have created under MGNREGA till date.

One of the successes of the **Individual Benefitting Scheme (IBS)** under MGNREGA has been depicted by Sohphoh VEC, Thadlaskein C&RD block, West Jaintia Hills District.

Smti. Iohpdianghun Suting, a beneficiary; leveraged MGNREGA to hone in her entrepreneurial skills and constructed this poultry shed which can accommodate about 100 layers. The cost is ₹47,500/- through MGNREGA added with a substantial contribution from her side.

She completed the project in August 2020 a span of two months. The fruits of labour are already evident in the 80 odd freshly laid eggs per day. The added trainings and capacity building through Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) has also helped in the care, packaging and many others as seen in the final packages ready for marketing.

Her daily income is around ₹ 800 through the sale of eggs, and she is spending almost ₹ 400 per day on chicken feed. **Her profit is therefore ₹ 400 per day.**

Market linkage for sale of eggs though not well established, she is selling the eggs at Ummulong, Jowai. She hopes to expand the enterprise to a larger scale.

Shri. Wallamkumar Lynrah, a poultry farmer in Mawsiatkhnam VEC, Mawlai C&RD Block, East Khasi Hills District upgraded his poultry farm with support from Mahatma Gandhi NREGA.

Wallamkumar is a hard-working and experienced farmer. Owing to financial constraint; he was unable to set up a proper shelter for his flock. Seeing his difficulties the VEC recommended Wallamkumar's name to the office of Block Development Officer & Programme Officer for the construction of a poultry shed through the Mahatma Gandhi NREGA.

The shed was constructed in convergence with Community Development Scheme for the purchase of the Incubator machine which amount to ₹ 50,000. Despite the hardship, the beneficiary also contributed ₹ 8,000 for material transportation costs. He worked on the shelter with the guidance of the Technical Assistant generating a total of 50 persondays during the FY 2020-21.

The project has transformed his poultry farming into a profitable one. With this shed and incubator, he was able to achieved 70%- 75% hatchability rates of eggs from the good quality parent stocks. 400 poultry at a rate of ₹ 150 per bird were sold and he was able to supply his local breed stocks to farmers from neighboring districts.

Dawki VEC is located in the banks of the River Umngot and sharing international border with Bangladesh in the south. The village has become a destination for many tourists because of the crystal clear water of the River Umngot. Most of the villagers depends their livelihood on areca nut plantation.

The construction of Piggery Shed and Soak pit at Dawki VEC involved the active participation of the Job Card Holders with guidance by the Block officials. Through Mahatma Gandhi NREGA the villagers took the opportunity to promote the art of rearing livestock in a scientific way with shed and soak pit being constructed.

Before the implementation of this project, the villagers are still practicing the traditional way of rearing pigs and without a proper shed and in an unhygienic way. This initiative aims to uplift the rural livelihood and generate employment to the beneficiaries with less income source. This has been a helping hand to the farmer whereby income can be generated by selling of pigs and piglets.

“I am immensely happy to receive the assistance through Mahatma Gandhi NREGA in the form of Piggery Shed. As a farmer I am unable to construct such a structure on my own. Before availing this shed, I reared pigs in a temporary shed made of wooden planks only and currently I am able to sell many pigs in a year.” Shri. Mankhraw Ryngksai, Beneficiary

Mawsynram area was once known as the wettest place on earth, but with sudden climate change they have lost their fame. Most of the land in the area was barren, rocky and steep. Despite receiving sufficient amount of rainfall throughout the year, lack of proper water storage, the water flows down the stream which led to soil erosion and unable to retain the water at site.

Realising the issues, the people of Mawteibah VEC came up with an initiative by planting trees under Mahatma Gandhi NREGA as part of the natural resource management activities. The VEC planted **4,500 saplings**, under the technical guidance of the Block officials. Only local indigenous water retaining trees were planted.







Exbucklandia populnea (Diengdoh), ***Castanopsis indica*** (Dieng Soh Ot), ***Fagaceae*** (Dieng Sning), ***Prunus***

cerasoides (Cherry Blossom/ Dienglieng) are the local indigeneous water retaining trees were planted.

The survival rate of the saplings is **88.9%** in which **4,000** plants survived. The long term effect will be visible in a few years.

Mynska VEC under Laskein C&RD Block is one of the coal-laden hubs in West Jaintia Hills Districts. Community lands were piling up with coal depot before exporting to the neighbouring States. Improper storing facilities of coal led to soil degradation and leeching of toxic water which runs through these depots and harmed the land as well as the vegetation.

Observing the problem faced by the people, the office of the Block Development Officer & Programme Officer, the Management Institute of Natural Resources (MINR), Meghalaya Basin Development unit & ECF Laskein Unit conducted awareness in reclaiming and restoring the degraded land through land development and plantation works. The VEC showed a positive response and was eager to take up the initiative.

The main objective was to reclaim and restore the highly degraded unused land. Through Mahatma Gandhi NREGA, the project was taken up in 2 phases. In Phase 1 of the project, contour terrace with drainage system was taken up across the area to control runoff and minimize soil erosion. In the 2nd Phase, land development which includes terracing and bamboo fencing were executed. A total of **25,000 Citronella saplings** were planted in convergence with MINR and MBDA.

“This mission of land reclamation transformed our vision in the VEC. I hope crop diversification will create a sustainable livelihood for us. We wanted to convert more of these wastelands into healthy and cultivable land. Over time, there is a slight improvement in the soil texture & moisture in the area.”

Ri Bhoi District is an agro-climatic zone in Meghalaya which is ideal for cultivation of a wide range of agriculture and horticulture crops. This initiative of bench terracing and earthen bunds taken up in Umtham VEC of Umsning C&RD Block opens a wide scope for cultivation providing livelihood activities and also prevents runoff water during the rainy season.

The villagers are 100% agrarians and depend on agriculture for their livelihoods. After the sowing and harvesting season is over, they mainly engaged in manual labor. People are poor and the PEIC members cannot afford to buy materials for construction projects. In order to improve the natural landscape of this unused land and with a vision for conservation of the natural ecosystem and increase in water content; the VEC under the guidance of the Technical Assistant concerned has chosen this project.

With the gradual deprivation of natural resources, the Govt. of India introduced the Jal Shakti Abhiyan campaign which focuses on the water conservation. Under MGNREGA, 60% of the projects implemented at the VEC level are focused on Natural Resource Management. In this connection awareness has been conducted to all VECs about the importance of Sustainable use of resources. The villagers were aware of the current deprivation and have come forward to put up projects based on NRM.

This project gave an opportunity for the villagers to take up farming on the slope land and also helped the people to gain employment without going to other villages in search for work. The produce harvested were nutritious vegetables like fresh beans, cucumber, carrot etc. which not only add nutrition to the people's dish but also help in their economy.

We are thankful to the Block Development Office & Programme Officer for implementing such initiative which has low material expenditures; it has a positive impact to the environment and the same time help us farmers to use the land for cultivation. Job Card Holder

Umkhoi VEC is situated under Mawkynrew C&RD Block, East Khasi Hills District, Meghalaya. With about 12 km away from the Block office and 49 active Job card holders, Umkhoi VEC is one of the village with maximum Anganwadi centres in the area.

The Anganwadi Centre was constructed in a spacious location in the heart of the village. On its own, the Anganwadi Centre has impacted majorly on their day to day lives of the mother and especially to the children, which they can have a proper space for pre-school, mid day meal etc.

With the help of the Block Development Office, the VEC decided to take up a kitchen garden in front of the centre and kept it as a poroject in the Annual Action Plan 2020-21 under MGNREGA. The children under the guidance of the ASHA workers were anticipated to get a practical experience and a chance to see how natures blossoms. Furthermore, the vegetables from the garden were used as an additional nutritive supplement for the children.

The children got an opportunity to observe their efforts taking shape. The initiative connected the children with nature and inculcated a sense of belonging along with responsibility towards clean and green environment.

Anganwadi Centre at Mawdiangdiang VEC

Mawdiangdiang VEC is situated just 7.4 Km away from capital city Shillong and falls under Mawpat C&RD Block, East Khasi Hills District, Meghalaya. The VEC has 131 households with a total population of 573. The livelihood activities of the villagers depend on daily wages which include unskilled labour and skilled labour works. Few households were engaged in agricultural activities.

Mawdiangdiang VEC started implementing MGNREGA in the year 2007 under Myllem C&RD Block. During the financial year, the VEC received a Mini Anganwadi but there is no proper storage of food and place for children to play and run around.

During summer, the children were unable to visit the centre. In return the mother had to collect the provided supplementary food for them. Witnessing the problem faced by the Anganwadi and the children, Mawkasiang Pyllun Dorbar Shnong in consultation with the Child Development Project Officer (CDPO) of Myllem Block submitted the application to get a fully functioning Anganwadi Centre 2012.

The Dorbar Shnong contributed a 6000 sq. Ft. community land to construct the Anganwadi Centre in the year 2018.

The Anganwadi Centre was included in the Annual Action Plan of Mawpat C&RD Block under MGNREGS in Convergence with ICDS during the FY 2018-19. The Work was taken up on the 15th July 2019 and completed on the 11th March 2020.

During the Implementation stage, the VEC being the nodal implementing agency at the grass-root level received support from the BDO & PO, Mawpat by converging with other line department i.e., Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS), CRPF 67 Battalion, Public Health Engineering (PHE) Department (SBM, RURAL), Fishery Department, MLA from SRWP 2020-21, Village Dorbar/VEC Voluntary Contribution for the successful implementation. The total cost of the project is ₹ 700,000 where ICDS under Social Welfare Department contributed an amount of ₹200,000 and MGNREGA contributed an amount of ₹500,000 out of which ₹ 299,200 is for wages and ₹ 200,800 for material component.

The Anganwadi centre marked as a successful implementation of MGNREGA in convergence with other line departments. The hardwork and dedication of the BDO &PO, the staff along with the VEC functionaries and the Job Card Holders made this a model Anganwadi Centre in the State. The centre provided ample space for pre-schooling, playing, distributing supplementary meal for the children. There were 80 children and 15 pregnant/lactating mothers in the VEC which catered by the centre.

“We are happy that this Anganwadi Centre provided our children a pre-school education, a proper space for playing and other activities. The Anganwadi worker herself alone has done a tremendous job in managing all the work at the centre. We requested the concern department to provide more helpers for better services to the children and us the mothers as well.”

With over thousands and thousands of Rural Infrastructure projects have been constructed under Mahatma Gandhi NREGA in Meghalaya, the cremation structure in Pynshongkhla VEC, Mawryngkneng C&RD Block, East Khasi Hills District is the first cremation site in the Block being constructed under this programme.

The number of cemetery/graveyard rise over the years and larger amount of land were required. Since Pynshongkhla is a small village, over the years the community was struggling and unable to get a new land for the cemetery. With the surge in COVID-19 deaths and situations that occurred during the pandemic; the VEC planned and proposed to establish a crematorium structure in the village to ease and tackle the problems faced within the community.

Under MGNREGA, a crematorium structure with platforms and chimney was constructed with a total amount sanctioned of ₹ 6,57,720/- in which ₹ 3,94,632/- was for material components and ₹ 2,63,088/- towards wages, generating 1,944 persondays. This project provided employment to the villagers besides providing desirable arrangement for the last rites.

The facility is open to everyone in need. With this structure the VEC aimed that residents from all faith and denominations can use this facility in performing their last rites.

According to the VEC secretary, since the completion - three cremations took place in this facility. Traditionally firewood - is used to incinerate the bodies.

Haribhanga-I VEC is located in the northern part of Demdema C&RD Block, West Garo Hills District. The VEC is situated in the banks of the Jinjiram River (Brahmaputra River tributaries). The area is prone to natural calamities and had multiple occurrences of floods and drought.

During the monsoon, the river swells and overflows to the bank which destroyed homes and forced many families to move out. Acres of paddy fields and livestock were washed away due to floods. In addition the flood also affected lives of the people and many precious lives were cost. This has been a recurring phenomenon every year. In FY 2020-21, a flood protection wall was identified as a possible solution.

The villagers requested to construct a Flood Protection (Boulder Sausage and Pitching) to the office of the Block Development Officer & Programme Officer. The project was sanctioned under MGNREGA. The total amount sanctioned of the work was ₹ 12,80,518 in which ₹ 6,44,113 was on material component and ₹ 6,34,405 on wages generating 3,135 persondays. The project has impacted the people in safeguarding more than 200 households living along the river bank.

The initiative under MGNREGA helped the residents of Haribhanga-I VEC to eliminate danger and discomfort. For the first time in years, the village now faced the monsoon rains without fear.

Chart 03: Persondays Generated (in lakh) : A comparative analysis of the performance in the last Five (5) Financial Year

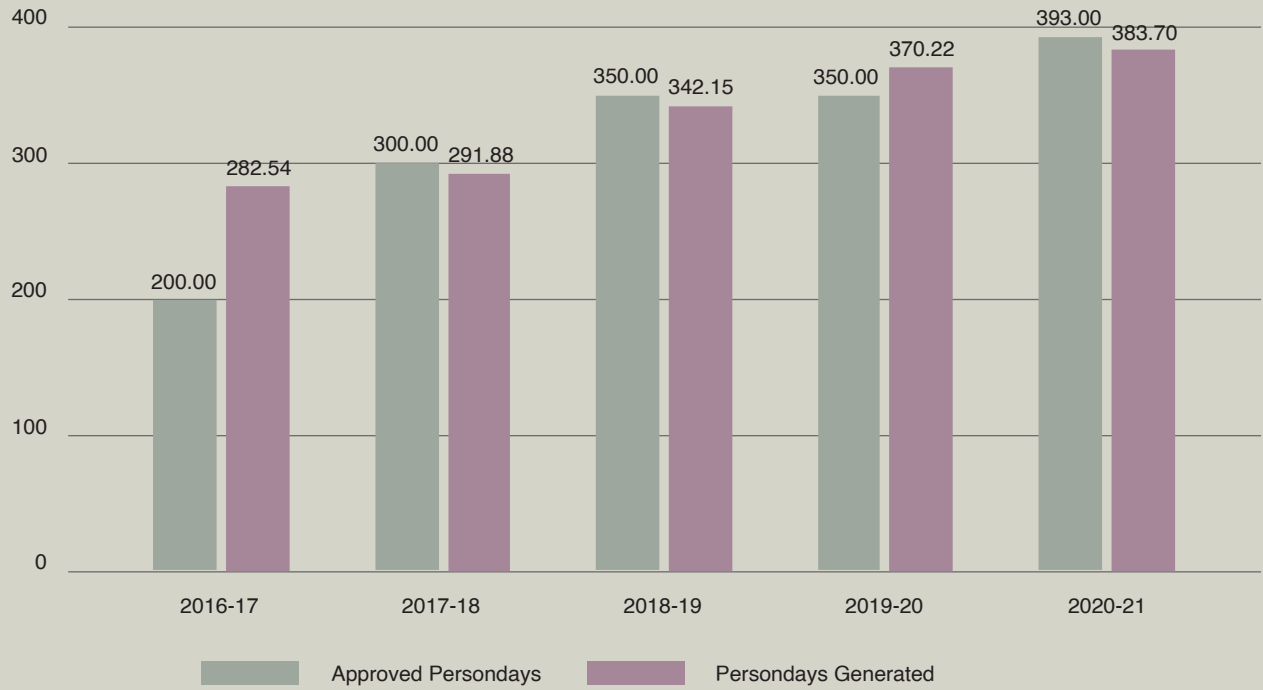


Chart 04: Average Persondays provided per Household (%) : A comparative analysis of the performance in the last Five (5) Financial Year

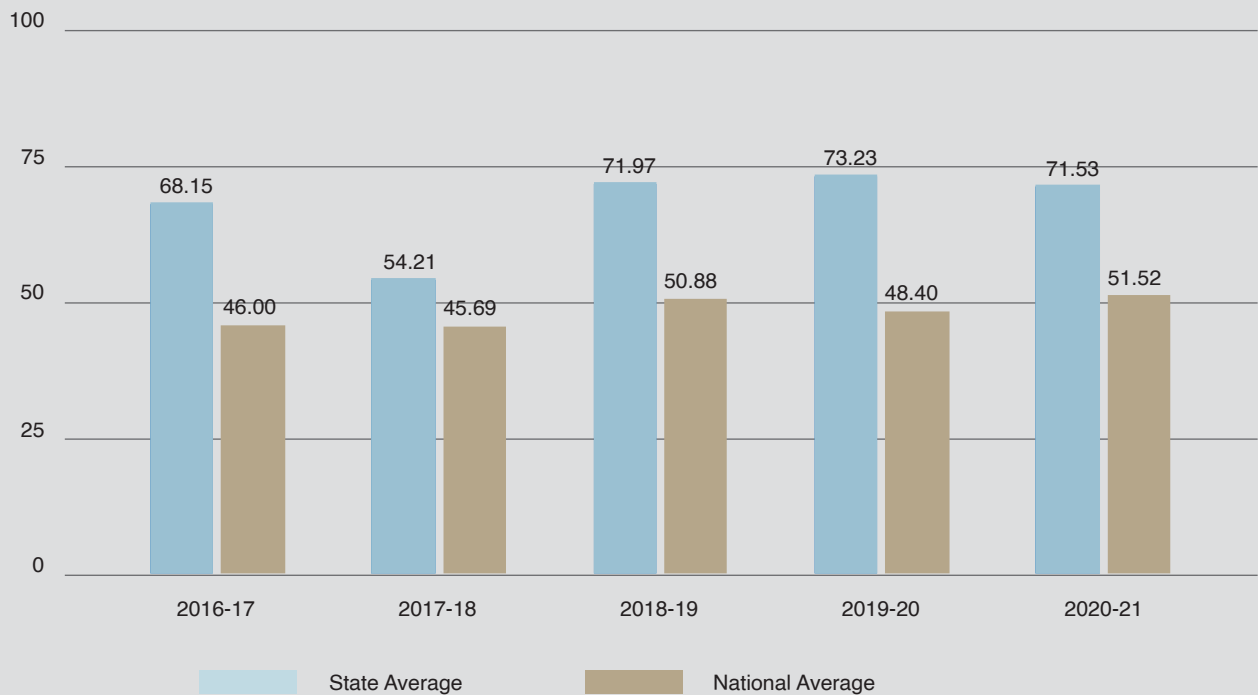
