### **Preface**

The implementation of the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) met with serious hurdles during 2012-13 due to delay in the fund releases. Even with such difficulties, the State could still provide 1.74 crore persondays against the projected target of 1.81 crore, achieving 96.13% of the Labour Budget for the year. With this provision, an average of 52 persondays could be provided to each household compared to the national average of 46 persondays. During the year, 174.31299 lakh persondays of employment were generated incurring an expenditure of ₹ 26589.99 lakh. The unskilled wage rate increased from ₹ 117/- per day to ₹ 128/- per personday during the year.

The State Rural Employment Society (SRES), established during FY 2011-12 provided impetus to the implementation of the MGNREGA in the State. The much needed institutional support at the State level for monitoring, evaluation, grievance redress and conducting need based training programmes for weaker village institutions, have been sincerely addressed by the SRES. The SRES has also effectively managed the State Corpus Fund, which was instituted to provide temporary assistance to the Districts during fund shortage. The State Corpus Fund was increased to ₹ 21 crore during FY 2012-13 from ₹ 15 crore in FY 2011-12. The State Corpus Fund provided ₹ 37 crore to the districts, and was rolled over several times during the year.

The Business Correspondent model initiated during FY 2012-13 showed signs of progress in a few Blocks in the East Khasi Hills and Jaintia Hills. In the initial stages people did not fully understand its objective and importance. Several awareness programmes were conducted to ensure that the initiative got the support of the people for smooth and secure disbursal of wages. Technological and manpower constraints continue to be hurdles, and efforts are on to address the issues.

Efforts to improve the ICT infrastructure in the Blocks are being made. The districts were instructed to ensure adequate power back up and computers for smooth operationalisation of the MIS. The National Informatics Centre (NIC) had provided 256 kbps of free bandwidth to VSATs installed in 34 Blocks but it was inadequate. After negotiations with the Ministry of Rural Development, the bandwidth was increased upto 700 mbps, which would further smoothen the online data entry process.

The convergence initiative to undertake blacktopping of 2 km MGNREGS roads per Block per year under the Black Topping of Rural Roads Scheme  $@ \\colored 25$  lakh per kilometer, was successfully implemented during FY 2012-13. 77.383 Km of MGNREGS roads were blacktopped during the year. Seeing the need to further this effort, to ensure better road connectivity to the rural areas, the State Government has increased the target to 4km per Block per year from FY 2012-13 onwards  $@\\colored 25$  lakh per km.

The State Government took initiatives for creation of the State Employment Guarantee Fund (SEGF) to ensure smoother and faster fund flow. With the SEGF in place from FY 2013-14 onwards, the State Government will be enabled to centralise the submission of Utilisation Certificates, thereby easing the burden of the Districts and ensure better fund control at the State level. Due to acute shortage of funds faced during FY 2012-13, a liability of ₹ 80.91 crore has spilled over to FY 2013-14.

In spite of the unprecedented fund constraints, the people took ample advantage of the Scheme in improving critical rural infrastructure and ensuring better livelihood opportunities through asset creation in the villages. Through continuous improvement in its management, the State Government will ensure that the MGNREGA is more effectively implemented in the ensuing year.

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# The Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act

#### 1. Introduction

The Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) is a flagship programme of the Government of India that directly affects the lives of the rural people. The primary objective of the Scheme is to provide livelihood security to the households in rural areas of the notified districts by providing 100 (one hundred) days of guaranteed wage employment in a financial year to every household whose adult members volunteer to do unskilled work through creation of durable assets and to strengthen the livelihood resource base of rural people. The emphasis of the MGNREGA for providing livelihood opportunities through creation of sustainable assets at the village level has brought about transformation to the rural areas of Meghalaya.

The institutions viz. Village Employment Councils(VECs), have spearheaded the transformation in the village through community bonding, voluntary dedication and grass root mobilisation. Proper planning and selection of works are extremely important to ensure effective implementation of the programme and utility of the assets. The MGNREGA has empowered the grassroot institutions including the traditional institutions in the State. The formation of the VECs has uniquely blended the roles and responsibilities of the traditional institutions and those of the Panchayati Raj institutions, without disturbing the existing democratic setup. The voluntary engagement of functionaries, whose relentless efforts have ensured that the programme is successfully run, is the driving force behind the achievements being seen in the villages of the State. Apart from improving rural infrastructure, livelihood opportunities have given additional resources to the people, especially for women.

During FY 2012-13, of the projected employment demand of 180.61 lakh persondays as per the Approved Labour Budget, the State could achieve 174.31 lakh persondays, with an average of 52 persondays per household. The participation of women was at 41%, higher than the mandatory participation of 33%.


In the year 2012-13, 3.33 lakh households were provided employment utilizing more than 97% of funds for the Scheme; the percentage of job card holders belonging to scheduled tribes was 91.63% and 0.83% was under SC category.



The year, however, had faced serious fund constraints due to late receipt of funds. State Corpus Fund (SCF) extended ₹ 37.00 crore during the year as a temporary assistance to meet the MGNREGA payments.

The topography of the land which leaves people with dire need for accessibility, prompts the villages to opt for road connectivity as a major option while undertaking MGNREGA projects. An initiative taken up during FY 2012-13 to provide sanitation facilities in convergence with Nirmal Bharat Abhiyan Programme, to be implemented by the Public Health Engineering (PHE) department in the State, has been successful.

During 2012-13, 11274 works were undertaken, of which 56.34% are taken up for rural connectivity, 13.95% on water conservation and for the other activities is below 10% each. The chart below shows the highest priority to rural connectivity under MGNREGA in Meghalaya.





### 2. State Corpus Fund

The MGNREGA, being demand driven, needs adequate funding especially at times when the demand is at its peak. It is experienced that delays in release of Central fund due to administrative reasons, result in subsequent delays in payments and slower implementation of projects.

The State Government has faced critical shortage of funds several times and the field officials face tough situations when the Job Card holders demand their wage payments. The State Corpus Fund is utilized when the Districts are facing fund shortage and while awaiting the release of next installment from the Centre. The State Corpus Fund would also cater to the fund shortage during peak seasonal demand for employment.

The State Government has set up the State Corpus Fund from 2011, and Districts can seek assistance for temporary funds for the implementation of MGNREGA in case of acute shortage of fund. In the year 2012-13, the amount assisted by the State Corpus Fund towards the Districts was ₹ 37 crore. The District wise break-up is as per the table below:

# **Training and Capacity Building**



### 1. Capacity Building

Capacity Building and technical support of State/ District/ Block level rural development functionaries/ agencies and members of the Area Employment Councils, awareness generation for potential and existing workers, forms the most strategic aspect in effectively implementing rural development schemes, policies and plans of the Government. Effective implementation of a centrally sponsored rural development programme like MGNREGA involves handling of multiple agencies.

In the absence of Panchayati Raj Institutions, the Village Employment Council and the Area Employment Council were formed to function as local bodies in the village. They have been identified as the principal agencies for the implementation of MGNREGS. It is, therefore, imperative to build the capacities of the village level functionaries





for effective implementation of MGNREGS, so that the rights and entitlements of the people can be safeguarded as per the mandate of the Act. The training programmes are focused on providing book keeping skills as well as awareness on the rights and entitlements under MGNREGA.

During the training programme some issues like non receipt of registers by VEC, delay in payment of wages and other implementation process were highlighted and discussed in detail. Based on the feedback received from the functionaries, District and Blocks are issued advisories to effectively implement the programme. Through the trainings, gaps that exist are bridged so the implementation of the Scheme can be smoothened to the possible extent.

State Institute of Rural Development (SIRD), the nodal agency for imparting capacity building in the State along with the Extension Training Center (ETC), have been imparting training from time to time to different levels of functionaries who are involved under MGNREGS. The State Rural Employment Society (SRES), the nodal agency for the Implementation of MGNREGA in the State, made training one of its focus areas of intervention. Along with SIRD & ETC, the SRES has been conducting several training programmes in order to boost the capacities of the implementing agencies.

During 2012-2013, SRES, SIRD and ETC conducted 81 training programmes with a total number of 4760 officials and village functionaries been trained. 5 (Five) training programmes on MIS under MGNREGA were also organised in collaboration with SIRD. About 118 Data Entry Operators and field officials were trained from across the different Blocks in the State.

# **Transparency and Accountability**

### 1. Payments of wages through Banks and Post Offices

In pursuance of the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD), earnest efforts were initiated by the State Government during Financial Year 2011-12 to promote Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) through Banks and Postal accounts. Due to weak banking network, accessbility to conventional banking systems was non-existent in unbanked areas. The post offices with a scattered presence in the State too have been able to provide any major support.

Due to these constraints, the wage payments of many villages had to be done by cash. However, with the adoption of the Business Correspondent (BC) models in partnership with several Banks viz. Axis Bank, ICICI Bank, SBI and MCAB non conventional banking practices could be initiated in a few Blocks for wage payments.

A year has passed since the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with partner Banks for BC Model and more progress has been reported:

During the initiation of the BC Banking Model in several parts in the State, a lot of effort was required to generate awareness and instill confidence amongst the people, as the process was new and there was no physical presence of the Banks. With continued effort, the BC Model could be launched in several Blocks and registration was carried out successfully.

By the end of Financial Year 2012-13, a few payments could be started through the BC accounts. As the initiative was still new, time is needed to identify the shortcomings and difficulties.

### 2. Social Audits and Public Hearings

Social audit is an effective means for ensuring transparency, participation, consultation and accountability under MGNREGA. The basic objective of social audit is to ensure public accountability in the implementation of projects, laws and policies. Vigilance and Monitoring Committees (VMCs) at the State as well as at the District level have been constituted for effective monitoring of the implementation of the programmes under MGNREGS.

The social audits and public hearings are fact finding tools. Through these forms, the geniune problems faced by the people can be learnt and redress mechanism can be devised in order to resolve the grievances. Moreover, they also provide an opportunity to the State Government to promote awareness and clarify issues in the implementation of the programme. A summary of the Social Audits and Public Hearings conducted across the State during Financial Year 2012-13 is as below:

Concerted efforts in conducting Social Audits and Social Audit Forums for generating awarweness and encouraging people to analyse the implementation of the Act were continued. The Facilitating Non Government Organisation(NGOs) were given maximum support through the District and State officials. Funding through administrative costs under MGNREGA, has helped in driving the social Audit exercises forward.

The year 2012-13 sprung a pleasant acknowledgement through a National Award recieved by East Garo Hills District in the implementation of the MGNREGA. Inspite of adverse difficult conditions, the acknowledgement would definitely boost the spirits of the officers, staff at the Block, District and State level to better their performance from time to time.



#### 3. Grievance Redress

In compliance to Ministry's directive, the Meghalaya Rural Employment Grievance Redress Rules 2009 were notified and this mechanism is being utilized to redress complaints at different levels of implementation. Moreover, immediate and regular inquiries are conducted by the State Rural Employment Society (SRES) whenever complaints are received at the State level and also based on newspaper reports. The State Government has also established the office of the Ombudsman for handling of grievances under MGNREGA in the allotted Districts. Till date, only four Districts have a functioning Ombudsman.

#### 4. Quality Monitoring

An important objective of the MGNREGA is creation of durable assets and strengthening the livelihood resource base of the rural people. As substantial amounts are being spent through MGNREGA, if implemented effectively, the programme has the potential to transform rural areas by creating durable assets that would not only enhance the livelihood security of the rural people but bring in substantial infrastructure development.

The physical and financial progress as well as social auditing of all works are monitored online. The members of the public and all those who desire to obtain information on various aspects of the implementation of the programmes can do so by visiting the rural website (www. megsres.nic.in) which provides all critical parameters such as Job Cards, Muster rolls, wage payments, number of employment provided and works under execution.

The State Rural Employment Soceity (SRES) has engaged professionals to look into the quality of the assets created under MGNREGA. In the financial year 2012-13, the officials appointed for quality monitoring have visited several projects created in all the districts. Apart from the SRES, the District and Block officials too conduct several inspections to ensure that the assets are created and utilised in an effective manner.

### 5. Management Information System

Concurrent monitoring plays an important role in effectively deploying resources toward meeting the objectives of MGNREGA. The scale and architecture of the MGNREGA demands effective and convenient monitoring, using the Information and Communication Technology (ICT).

A computer based MIS has been developed to monitor the programme from the portal [http://nrega.nic.in]. This makes data transparent and available in public domain to be equally accessed by all. Necessary infrastructure have been provided to all the Community & Rural Development (C&RD) Block offices.

The Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD) informed the State Government that from FY 2012-13 onwards the fund release shall be solely based on the financial statements generated from the MIS. The MoRD had also instructed that all States must start issuing eMR (electronic Muster Rolls) for all works undertaken under MGNREGA and w.e.f 1st April 2013 onwards only eMR would be utilized. Hence all Block's software was updated to NREGASoft version 6.0 in order to generate eMR offline.

In order to asses the status of MIS operationalization, a review-cum-training was conducted at the office of the State Rural Employment Society (SRES). Further, an inspection of all the Blocks was conducted to review the ICT infrastructure. It was observed that of the 32 VSATs that have been installed 27 VSATs were functional. Moreover, 28 out of the 39 Blocks did not have regular power supply or power back up. As the availability of uninterrupted power supply is essential for effective implementation of IT enabled solutions, the Districts were instructed to provide the Blocks with alternate power back up in the form of generators or inverters. The review was helpful in strengthening the ICT infrastructure of the Block and enabled them effectively to utilize the ICT tools for ensuring better reporting mechanism.

During FY 2012-13, all the Blocks were trained for starting e-Muster Rolls (eMR). The eMR is an effective solution to provide the Village Employment Councils (VECs) with muster rolls that are pre-printed with the details of the beneficiaries viz. name, age, gender, job card number etc. The old practice of providing blank Muster Rolls has delayed their submission to the Block office as the paper work is enormous. Many village functionaries express discomfort over the work load of filling in the details in the Muster Rolls.

Due to various technical issues, the online MIS reports were not reflecting 100% of the achievements as per the data entered in the offline NREGASoft. Therefore, the MoRD had strongly suggested that the Blocks should be shifted to online mode of data entry. The VSATs were provided with a bandwidth of 256 kbps free of cost by the NIC. It was inadequate for doing online data entry as its speed was too slow. Therefore, an increase in the bandwidth, from 256 kbps to 512 kbps, was requested from the Ministry which was subsequently approved in October 2013. Further, in order to strengthen the Internet Connectivity for online data entry, the bandwidth was increased to 2Mbps during March 2013. This would facilitate shifting of data entry to online systems in FY 2013-14.







## **Black Topping of Rural Roads Schemes (BTRRS)**

Over the years, the Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India have proposed and implemented many rural development schemes with co-operation from the State Government. The present scheme BTRRS being one of the scheme that is solely dedicated for the purpose of rural development focusing on improving road connectivity and quality. This scheme is proposed to improve the MGNREGS rural 'Kutcha or unmetalled' road into 'metalled or all weather roads'.

The lack of communication and transportation system is the greatest barrier in putting the natural resources to be used for the benefit of the rural areas. The objective for the construction of the BTRRS project in convergence with the MGNREGS is to reduce poverty and to support the economic growth of rural communities. The project also enhanced access to various produce, market, trade, employment opportunities and social service centre including health and education for the poor .


Rural connectivity is much more important in Meghalaya because of its terrain. Many villages have directly or indirectly benefited from MGNREGS connectivity projects as they connect village to village, village roads to State or main roads, village to market, etc., MGNREGS roads are kutcha roads and transportation through these roads is not smooth during peak monsoon season. During rainy season, parts of the roads are eroded, making these roads difficult to traverse. The only solution to make these projects durable is to converge with other line departments for providing blacktopping and metalling.



The Government of Meghalaya has taken the initiative to converge with the MGNREGA to construct durable roads in rural areas under the Scheme "Blacktopping of Rural Roads Scheme (BTRRS)". The State Government has earmarked R 19.50/- Crore in the year 2011-12 for blacktopping 2 kilometre (km) of rural roads constructed under MGNREGS per block @ R 25.00/- Lakhs per kilometre. An additional of R 39.00/- Crore was sanctioned to the C&RD Department during 2012-13 for Blacktopping of 4km per Block. The convergence programme under BTRRS started during the year 2012-13 and has proven to be the most essential step in improving rural connectivity and the economy as a whole. The projects highlighted in this report are those sanctioned during Financial Year (FY) 2011-12 but implemented during financial Year 2012-13.

Being the first year of implementation, the BTRRS has seen many villages clamouring for taking up their MGNREGA roads. An initial hiccup during implementation of the Scheme, is the scarcity of road rollers. As the road rolleres had to be hired from the Public Works Department (PWD), their non-availability led to delays in the implementation of the projects. BTRRS length covered is 77.383Km of MGNREGA roads for an amount of R 19.31 crore during the financial year 2011-12. Seeing its success, the State Government has decided to increase the target to 4 Km per Block from financial year 2012-13.







### East Garo Hills District

# 1. Orange Plantation At Dambo Watesa VEC, Dambo Rongjeng C&RD Block, East Garo Hills



Dambo Watesa VEC which falls under Dambo Rongjeng C&RD Block took this project to realize their dream in enhancing their livelihood during winter season. This project under taken with great enthusiasm during FY 2012-13 was expected to bear fruit in the next few years. The plantation area is about 3 hectare and from it about 2 quintals of oranges were harvested and sold during the current financial year. This project generated about 1275 mandays with a total wage expenditure of R 1,63,200/-.

This project has served as a model to other VECs to adopt income generating projects to strengthen their rural livelihood resources.



# 2. Creation of Paddy field at Dobetkolgre Songmong VEC, Samanda C & RD Block, East Garo Hills




The photographs depict the land development work for paddy cultivation at Dobetkolgre Songmong village which lies along the Simsang basin. Villagers are mostly farmers and earn their livelihood through farming. They are hard working farmers and adopt multi-cropping practices to enhence their field productivity . With increasing number of family members, there are more mouths to feed and their earnings were not sufficient to meet the needs of the family. With no resources to spare, they could not garner enough resources to increase their paddy field even though the land was available nearby.

Therefore, the villagers of Doberkolgre Songmong VEC undertook the creation of a new paddy field as part of Land Development activity in the FY 2012-13. With the completion of this project, farmers could grow more crops in their new paddy field and earned additional income for their livelihood. The total land area is 3.31 hectares. The total wage amounts to ₹4,24,960/- along with R 2,700/- on material expenses leading to a total expenditure of ₹4,27,660/-.



### East Khasi Hills District

# 1. Footpath Cum Railing At Mawkdok, Khatarshnong Laitkroh C&RD Block, East Khasi Hills



The Footpath at Mawkdok which stretches for about 1.2 kms was implemented by Mawkdok VEC of Khatarshnong Laitkroh C&RD Block, East Khasi Hills District during the Financial Year 2012 – 13 at a sanctioned amount of ₹ 17,24,800/- (Material Cost + Skilled Wages= ₹ 6,89,920/- and Unskilled Wages= ₹ 10,34,880/-). This Footpath was constructed along the Shillong – Sohra PWD Road. It is reported as one of the best community assets implemented under MGNREGS wherein pedestrians, especially children, can easily stroll to their school or work place via this footpath. The project generated 8085 persondays. The project work started on 19<sup>th</sup> November 2012 and completed on 12<sup>th</sup> January 2013.



# 2. Construction of Footpath at Laitsohpliah VEC in Covergence with MRDS, Khatarshnong Laitkroh C&RD Block, East Khasi Hills



The footpath was constructed during the financial year 2012-13 in Convergence with MRDS(Meghalaya Rural Development Society) at the total cost of ₹ 5,54,880/-. Out of the total cost of ₹ 2,21,952/- being the material cost was borne by MRDS and the remaining being the wages from the MGNREGS is ₹ 3,32,928/-. All the households registered under MGNERGA took an active part in the construction of the footpath. The completed footpath have attracted a lot of tourist, both the local and the domestic as the view from the top of the mountain is magnificent. The construction of the footpath under MGNREGS in Convergence with MRDS has uplifted the economy of the village.



# 3. Construction of Footpath at Laitmawsiang VEC, Khatarshnong Laitkroh C&RD Block, East Khasi Hills



The footpath was constructed during the financial year 2012-13 under MGNREGS at the total cost of  $\ref{0.990,080/-}$ . Out of the total cost of  $\ref{0.990,080/-}$  so the total cost of  $\ref{0.990,080/-}$  so the material and the wages is  $\ref{0.990,048/-}$  implemented by Laitmawsiang VEC. The footpath runs through the entire village and has gone a long way in providing easy access by villagers to their homes. The implementation of the footpath under MGNREGS has rendered the villagers a much easier way to commute through the difficult terrain work fields in the village.



### **South Garo Hills District**

# 1. RCC Footbridge at New Rongara, Bonbera VEC, Rongara C&RD Block, South Garo Hills



The RCC Footbridge (8m) shown above at New Rongara VEC constructed under MGNREGS in Rongara Development Block for an estimated amount of ₹ 326400/- (Wages=₹ 195840/- and Material=₹ 130560/-) which generated 3627 mandays. This bridge leads to Rongara Primary Health Centre. People had faced difficulty in crossing the stream during rainy season. With the construction of the bridge, people can now conveniently cross the stream easily to go to the hospital and to other parts of the village.


The following RCC Footbridge at Bonbera VEC constructed under MGNREGS in Rongara Development Block of length 10m for the need of the VEC having around 50 household with an estimated amount of ₹ 332800/- (Wages=₹ 199680/- and Material=₹ 133120/-) and generated 7987 mandays. The bridge has benefitted the people of the area for crossing the stream to go to church, school etc.



# 2. Construction of CC Footpath at Dambuk Aga VEC, Rongara C&RD Block, South Garo Hills & Construction of RCC Footbridge at Inolgre VEC, Rongara C&RD Block, South Garo Hills



The construction of CC Footpath from Dambuk Adinggre to Community Hall at total length of 250m at Dambuk Aga VEC was constructed under MGNREGS in Rongara Development Block for an estimated amount ₹ 3,46,667/- (Wages= ₹ 20,800/- and Material= ₹ 1,38,667/-). The construction of the footpath was implemented during the financial year 2012-2013. The road has benefitted the 643 population of Dambuk Aga area to School, to Community Hall and the market.



The construction of RCC Footbridge over Gopram Chiring (15m) at Inolgre VEC was constructed under MGNREGS in Rongara Development Block for an estimated amount of ₹ 4,48,000/-(Wages= ₹ 2,68,800/- and Material= ₹ 79,200/- ) created 9956 mandays. The area before used to be a deep stream of around 7ft. The construction of the footbridge has helped the poaple of the villange to go around the area and to the market even during the rainy season. The footbridge has benefitted the people of Inolgre, Seelpang, Taidang and Rona Agal which has a population of 200 households.

### **West Garo Hills District**

# 1. Fishery Pond at Mangdugre VEC, Dadenggre C&RD Block, West Garo Hills



Mangdugre Village is situated about 11 kms from the Dadenggre Block Office, it has 58 number of job card holders under the VEC. The village has demanded for this project because the village people have seen the need for fish-ponds as they have inadequate supply of fish in the village. The project will also serve as a water source during lean period. The village started stocking fingerlings in the pond and the villagers hope for good returns in future. The project has been implemented with an estimated amount of  $\ref{3,81,696/}$ - on wages,  $\ref{12,000/}$ - on material and generated 2982 mandays. A total expenditure of  $\ref{3,93,696/}$ - was incurred for completing the project.



# 2. Fishery Pond at Rondupara VEC, Dadenggre C&RD Block, West Garo Hills



This fishery pond was taken up by the VEC in the year 2011-12, and completed in 2012-13. The main objective of taking up of this project by the VEC was to lift the economic status of the village as well as to establish a durable asset that would sustain the needs of the people of the village.

The Village had to depend on traders for the supply of goods and fish though they had streams and rivers for fish, but due to excessive fishing activity, the supply ran short. Hence the village thought of taking up the project under MGNREGS for setting up of a Fishery pond so they can produce for themselves and as well as supply to nearby markets. The village has nearly 16 fishery ponds constructed under MGNREGS, taken up from the previous years. The village now is producing enough fish for themselves. The scheme has taught people to depend on themselves rather than to depend on others for fishes.

The scheme is really helping the people of the villages not only financially but also in bringing out their entrepreneurial skills.




# 3. Construction of Road from Tomagre to PWD Road, Dadenggre C&RD Block, West Garo Hills



The village of Tomagre that falls under Tomagre AEC of West Garo Hill District is situated about 12 kms from the Dadenggre Block. The village has a population of about 400 people. Their main occupation is agriculture and the major products are Betelnut, Rubber and Cashew-nuts. As the village Tomagre is located about 4 kms from the nearby PWD Road, transporting their produce from their village to their nearest Rom Agal market, which is about 6 km away, was a tedious walk.


With the taking up of this project, the villagers no longer need to pass through thick jungles to reach their weekly market and hence feel safe and secure. Their product can now reach the market easily without any delay. Thus, the scheme has helped the villagers immensely not only through connectivity but also in reducing the time taken to transport their agricultural products to the market. It has helped in improving the overall livelihood of the villagers.

The project has been implemented with an estimated amount of ₹ 5,09,568/- on wages, ₹ 2000/- on material and generated 3981 mandays, on a total expenditure of ₹ 5,11,568/-.




### West Khasi Hills District

1. Construction of CC Footpath from PWD Road to KSA playground, Mission East VEC, Mairang C&RD Block, West Khasi Hills



Mission East VEC is one of the villages in Mairang GS Circle under West Khasi Hills District. This village is located at a distance of 2 Km approximately from the Block office. The villagers appreciate the MGNREGA and are motivated and cooperative when it comes to taking up the works under MGNREGA.

The villagers feel that the scheme is a boon to the village. This footpath is used for connecting one household with the other and made traversing much safer. It has also beautified the look of the village and proved to be one of the most successful projects taken up under the Scheme. This project generated a total of 5596 mandays. The total cost of the project is R 10,00,000/- only.




# 2. Construction of Footpath at Nonghyllam VEC, Ranikor C&RD Block, West Khasi Hills



Nonghyllam village is one of the biggest villages in Nongjri. It has 130 houses and a population of 1000 members' approximatly. Nonghyllam VEC is under Nongjri AEC and the distance from the head quatter is around 20 Kms. The area is mostly barrent land due to heavy coal mining and it is mostly the income generation source for the people. The Construction of the footpath was taken during the financial year 2012-13 at the total cost of R 8,42,240/- with a total persondays of 4662. Villagers are very co-operative, the functionaries of the VEC are motivational, maximum number of workers at work site are recorded, meetings are usually held before taking up any decision. All the projects given were implemented very well which have brought lots of development to the people besides income generating source. Prior to the implementations of the scheme (MGNREGA), developmental activities in the village are very much lacking.



# 3. Construction of Drinking Water Well at Mawkatad VEC, Mawthadraishan C&RD Block, & Construction of the Washing Platform at Pomdkhar VEC, Mawshynrut C&RD Block, West Khasi Hills



Pomdkhar is a village under Umdein AEC which is under Riangdo Circle. The distance from block headquatter is around 8 km. The village is situated near the national highway to Tura. The people residing in this place are mostly Nongtrai, Lyngngam and Maram. The number of houses in the village are around 50 households and the main occupation is farming and daily wagers.

The conctruction of the washing platform was taken during the financial year 2012-13 at the total cost of ₹ 2,37,850/- with the total persondays of 1859.

In this area there are few rivers and streams where people go and wash their clothes. The construction of the washing platform has helped the people of the village to utilized the facility in their own door step. The people of the village are very much happy with the Government for providing such facility to them as they are ready to work hard to get the best out of it.

Mawkatad is one of the beautiful places under Mawthadraishan C&RD Block in West Khasi Hills District. It's mostly hilly and it shares its border with Mairang C&RD Block. The people here are mostly farmers. The presence of this scheme has become the biggest boon to them as it provides income as well as assets that are very important and necessary. There are many projects undertaken under this VEC and one of them is a drinking well, situated in the village. In this village there are only a few sources where water is available and one of them is this. The water here is available throughout the year. The villagers are very grateful to MGNREGA because it's the only scheme that they can choose the projects as per the need of the village and to implement it accordingly. The construction of the drinking well generated 420 persondays on a total expenditure of ₹ 75,040/- only. The well has provided an additional water source for the village and can be used for the domestic purposes.


# National Award For East Garo Hills District MGNREGA Team During MGNREGA Sammelan 2012-13













MEGHALAYA Notified Wage Rate
